LSAT Tests

Law schools require you to take the LSAT. The test is only offered at specific times. You can register online at the Law School Admission Council website (<u>www.lsac.org</u>). I'd recommend taking the summer to study for it. Generally, the dates for the test are as follows:

- Early June 2012 (Register by early May 2012)
- Early October 2012 (Register by early September 2012)
- Early December 2012 (Register by early November 2012)
- Early February 2013 (Register by Early January 2013)

(Please see the LSAC website for the exact dates when they're announced)

Other things to start doing this summer for Law School:

- Start looking up and researching the law schools you're interested in.
- Start pursuing recommendation letters.
- Prepare your Personal Statement.
- Prepare your resume.
- Register with LSDAS The Law School Data Assembly Service (and then send them your transcript).
- To start school in Fall 2013, you'd need to send your application(s) in November 2012.

For those considering test prep:

- Visit the website for the Law School Admission Council (<u>www.lsac.org</u>) and download their free prep materials, including Sample Question with Explanations and a copy of an older LSAT exam. Take the exam under timed conditions to see how you'd do on the real thing.
- Think about picking up a test prep book there are plenty to be found on Amazon, with ample review provided.
- If you feel you need it, you may also consider taking a test prep course, such as through Kaplan, Princeton Review, Test Masters, etc. Do your research to find the right one for you.
